Membership in a Local Church

Is it necessary, and what's involved in doing so?

But, before we do that...

Let's talk about what happens when we **first** become a Christian

When we are baptized into Christ...

- God forgives or remits our sins; He "washes" them away—Acts 2:38; 22:16; Colossians 2:12-13.
- And what is our relationship to Jesus Christ?
 - We "marry" Christ; put on Christ; belong to Christ; we are joined to Christ; we are added to Christ—Mark 9:41; Rom. 7:4; Gal. 3:26-29; 1 Cor. 6:17; Acts 5:14; 11:24.
 - To use the language of Ephesians 2:5-6, God makes us alive together with Christ, raises us up together with Christ, makes us sit together with Christ in the heavenly places.

When we are baptized into Christ...

- We therefore become members of the body of Christ—
 1 Cor. 12:13.
 - Because we're joined to Christ, we're joined together with everyone else who is joined to Christ.
- This body is also called the church—Eph. 1:22-23.
 - Includes all the saved—Ephesians 5:23.
 - Includes all the saved from all ages, living and dead—Hebrews 12:22-24.
- It's what we often refer to as the universal church.

Here's an example...

- Crispus—Acts 18:7–8.
 - And so, Crispus was married to Christ, put on Christ, was
 joined to or added to Christ. He became a member of the
 body of Christ.
- But, he was also a member of something else—the church at Corinth (1 Corinthians 1:2, 14).
 - A church that met together to eat the Lord's supper (11:17-34), and engage in other forms of worship (ch. 14).
 - A church with a common treasury (16:1-3).

So, how does that work?

How do you become a member of a local church?

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- Attendance alone does not make one a functioning, faithful member of a local church—1 Corinthians 5.
 - How do we know for sure you're not just "visiting around"—unless you indicate your intentions?
- In the N.T. individual Christians **joined** a local church (Acts 9:26), and each church had a recognizable membership (1 Cor. 14:23).
 - Hard for elders to oversee the flock if they don't know for sure who's in the flock—1 Peter 5:2.

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- When you indicate to the elders you want to be a part of a local church, they now know they can count on you for much more—Eph. 4:16.
 - Suppose some brethren were starting a new local church in another location? How would we know who intends to a part of it?
- Stating one's intentions gives the elders/brethren the opportunity to decide whether or not to "receive" you—Acts 9:26; 18:27-28.
